Anti-ableism and scientific accuracy in autism research: a false dichotomy

Frontiers in Psychiatry

This new publication in Frontiers explores how anti-ableism vs scientific research is not a false dichotomy. Ableism has the impact of devaluing those of different abilities in interpersonal interactions and broader social contexts, and has unfortunately been inherent in earlier works led by non-autistic researchers claiming that their using such language and implications is required for "scientific accuracy." Examining these false leads may help current researchers better understand how ableism may negatively influence their areas of inquiry and lead to a new wave of anti-ableism serving as a requirement for academic rigor.
